My dear Friends,

On this second day before Christmas, I am happy to come again and to wish you a very "lucid" one! This is an idea taken from the President of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops. Lucid comes from latin and means "from the light", "filled with light", "clear".

We just lost our dear Tata Madiba who was one of those lucid ones, who reflected light and was a bearer of light in our world. With him, four other students took these two important steps in their lives as missionaries. Fr. In Merrivale, at our seminary, on 13<sup>th</sup> December, two of our theology students also took their

missionary oath; the following day, they were ordained deacons. They are Antony Alckias from India and Tomasz Podrasik from Poland. We were many people for the two celebrations. Our two students studying Zulu were also present: Martin – who



wrote that nice article in the last two Newsletter – and Samuel. One aspirant from Bethlehem, Mpho Moses, was also present. After the feasts, Mpho went with the Fathers from Lebombo to spend a few days in their Parish. He went back home just in time to celebrate his birthday with his family!

All these students who took their oath and who became deacons,

shall be ordained priests in the coming year. Let us keep them in our prayers.

Yesterday, I received a message from Patrick, who is now taking his second year of philosophy in Balaka, Malawi. See the box for some extracts. Patrick, keep it up! And we wish you all the best in your studies! I don't know yet who will go to join you there before you finish your third year!

Once again, I would like to wish you a very "lucid" Christmas, filled with the light of the New Born Christ and guiding you to Him, and to others who are in need of his golden light and solace.
